Welcome to the 2023/24 season of the Nashville Symphony.

Every year as I begin programming the upcoming season, I use as my guiding star three core principles centered on our audiences.

First, it's about you. We're in Music City, so our audiences are among the most adventurous in the world. This means we can put our own Nashville stamp on every program by elevating under-represented voices like Florence Price, William Dawson, Anna Clyne, Julia Perry, and Grażyna Bacewicz. We illuminate the voices of our time like Jessie Montgomery, Chick Corea, Antonio Estévez, and John Corigliano.

Presenting these voices in context with well-known repertoire refreshes the classics and helps us hear them in a new light. Nashville appreciates great talent when they hear it, and to sweeten the deal we invite universally loved soloists like Yo-Yo Ma, Gil Shaham, Sasha Cooke, Jean-Yves Thibaudet, Jennifer Koh, Zuill Bailey, and many others to collaborate with us.

Second, it's about our incredible orchestra. As our ensemble continues to grow and evolve, each new season builds on the foundation of everything that came before it. In 2023/24 we are performing seminal works to showcase the virtuosity and versatility of our musicians including Stravinsky's *The Rite of Spring*, Elgar's *Enigma Variations*, Prokofiev's Fifth Symphony, Orff's *Carmina burana*, and Mahler's Tenth Symphony.

Finally, it's about what — and how — the Symphony contributes to the cultural fabric of Nashville, Middle Tennessee, and well beyond our city limits. We're proud of the relationships we've developed with composers and how they seek out our orchestra to record with us. We're proud of our commissions and world premieres that bring new works to life. And we're proud of our 14 GRAMMY® Awards and 27 nominations. All of these reinforce Nashville's global reputation as the city that "music calls home."

There is something so simple and yet profound about experiencing live music together as a community. We welcome you to join us.

Celebrating Gershwin RHAPSODY IN BLUE

It must have been a daunting moment in 1924 for 26-year-old George Gershwin when he was asked to write a classical-jazz concerto for orchestra — and finish it in just five weeks! Who could have known this genre-blending experiment would become Rhapsody in Blue, one of the greatest works in American music? Join us as we honor its centennial and Gershwin's innovative spirit with three different versions that span our entire season: Opening night with Béla Fleck on banjo, a jazzier take on the Pops series with Tony DeSare, and the original on our Classical series with pianist Jean-Yves Thibaudet.

Our opening night special features arguably the world's greatest banjo player, Béla Fleck, a long-time friend of and a favorite collaborator with the Nashville Symphony. He literally started working on this classic while he was still in high school, and now, at the height of his artistry, we'll get to hear his dazzling rendition for the first time with an orchestra. THE RITE OF SPRING

Our season opens with works that stretched boundaries and show the orchestra's extraordinary range. Giancarlo Guerrero compares *The Rite of Spring* to "heavy metal" — still astounding more than a century after its debut. Julia Perry's 1952 *Short Piece* packs in vigorous rhythms, pensive melancholy, and thunderous sound effects. And the one-and-only Garrick Ohlsson, a longtime collaborator in Nashville, joins us for Brahms' sublime First Piano Concerto.

Ruth Reinhardt's Nashville debut features two piano concertos composed centuries apart. At one end of the spectrum is Bach's 1730s Keyboard Concerto in A Major, at the other is Rounds by Jesse Montgomery. Written in 2022 in close collaboration with Awadagin Pratt, The Boston Globe praised Rounds for its "narrative flair and structural clarity." Bookending the concert are Bacewicz's contemplative Partita for Orchestra and one of the most beloved works in the repertoire, Brahms' First Symphony.

Reprising a triumphant 2022 San Francisco Symphony premiere, Giancarlo Guererro and Timothy McAllister bring us John Corigliano's aptly named Triathlon — an athletic feat, with McAllister switching among three saxophones. The San Francisco Chronicle raved "it grabbed a listener's attention...and lingered long in the memory..." Respighi's Fountains of Rome and Pines of Rome — sweeping pictorials of his native Italy — round out this program that opens with a favorite Mozart overture.

New York Philharmonic prinicpal trombonist Joseph Alessi — a veritable rock star among American brass players — takes center stage with a work written for him by the late, great jazz legend Chick Corea, premiered with Giancarlo Guerrero in São Paolo. Szymanowski's Concert Overture is an exuberant concert opener, and Giancarlo ties it all together with Prokofiev's Romeo and Juliet Suite, which perfectly captures the drama and heartbreak of Shakespeare's immortal story.



Happy Birthday, John Corigliano

When they first met in 2000, John Corigliano had just won an Oscar for *The Red Violin* and Giancarlo Guerrero was a last-minute substitute conducting the Minnesota Orchestra's world premiere of the composer's *Phantasmagoria*. It was an immediate bond, and the beginning of a friendship that has since yielded three additional premieres together.

Corigliano, the current dean of American composers, is no stranger to Nashville — and, as Guerrero says, "he was blown away by the orchestra's performance of his First Symphony." We celebrate Corigliano's 85th birthday this season with two of his works, written for the soloists appearing with us. In October, Timothy McAllister performs *Triathlon* for three saxophones. And in January, mezzo-soprano Sasha Cooke sings *One Sweet Morning*, a poignant commemoration of 9/11. And the best news of all? Both performances will be recorded live for commercial release.

When Aaron Copland first visited Mexico, he remarked, "Mexico has turned out even grander than I expected, and I expected pretty grand things." El Salón Mexico draws upon that sentiment, headlining a program inspired by Latin America's beauty and culture. Piazzolla's Sinfonía Buenos Aires captures the tango's provocative essence, and Giancarlo Guerrero has invited Aquiles Machado and Juan Tomás Martinez as soloists for Antonio Estévez's Cantata Criolla, a Faustian singing contest between Florentino and the Devil.

Giancarlo Guerrero explores the range of emotions of art borne from grief. After visiting a friend's posthumous art exhibit, Mussorgsky exclaimed "Ideas, melodies, come to me of their own accord." He penned Pictures at an Exhibition with a feverish intensity, and the result is a work that showcases the virtuosity found within the orchestra. Sasha Cooke joins us for One Sweet Morning, John Corigliano's achingly beautiful song cycle written to commemorate the tenth anniversary of 9/11.

Associate Conductor Nathan Aspinall conducts our annual concert shining the spotlight on an up-and-coming pianist. The phenomenally gifted Janice Carissa takes the stage for Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 17 — premiered in 1784 by one of Mozart's rising star students. Anna Clyne's This Midnight Hour, inspired by poetry, makes full use of the spectrum of colors in the orchestra. And Sergei Prokofiev's Symphony No. 5 was penned at the height of WWII as "a hymn to free and happy Man...his pure and noble spirit."

Hailed by *NPR* as "one of the most brilliant artists of her generation," **Jennifer Koh** joins **Giancarlo Guerrero** for **Barber**'s exquisite **Violin Concerto**. **Tania León**'s Pulitzer Prize-winning **Stride**, reflecting her Cuban American heritage, was part of a project celebrating the 19th Amendment. Anchoring the program is a repertoire staple, the *Enigmα* **Variations**, a musical portrait gallery of the composer's friends with an autobiographical look at himself.

Each season, we showcase the Schermerhorn's world-renowned pipe organ in a symphonic concert. Enter the versatile Wayne Marshall, leading from the console as soloist in the Poulenc Organ Concerto and from the piano for Gershwin's Second Rhapsody. On the podium, he conducts Harlem and the Symphonic Dances from West Side Story, by American icons whose mixing of jazz and classical idioms captured the spirit of 1950s and 1960s New York City.

With 14 GRAMMY® Awards and 27 nominations, the Nashville Symphony is one of our country's most prolific recording orchestras, championing American composers and bringing their music — and our orchestra — to a global audience.

When we record, we do it live. The energy we feel from you, our audience, is part of the magic sauce that makes the results all the more special. This season, we're recording three important works with the artists who inspired them: John Corigliano's *Triathlon* with Timothy McAllister (Oct 27 & 28) and One Sweet Morning with Sasha Cooke (Jan 5 to 7), and Chick Corea's Trombone Concerto with Joseph Alessi (Nov 2 to 4). And we also record Antonio Estevez's Cantata Criolla (Nov 17 & 18). Join us! And if we get nominated or win, you'll be a part of history!





BEETHOVEN AND SHOSTAKOVICH

Zuill Bailey, a longtime friend of the Nashville Symphony, flawlessly navigates the virtuosic pyrotechnics of Dmitri Shostakovich's Cello **Concerto No. 1** – specifically chosen for this concert by Giancarlo Guerrero. Two of Beethoven's even-numbered symphonies surround the concerto, and though they are less-often performed in concert, they remain two of his most poignant and profound works.



DAWSON, PRICE, AND GERSHWIN'S AMERICA

Gershwin's orchestral music defined the American sound, and Jean-Yves Thibaudet joins us for our centennial celebration of *Rhapsody in Blue* plus his Piano Concerto in F. Gershwin is complemented by Florence Price and William Dawson, whose compositions stemmed from the Black American Experience. At its 1934 Carnegie Hall premiere, Dawson's *Negro Folk Symphony*, based on spirituals and emphatically symphonic, brought audiences to their feet. And Price's *Dances in the Canebrakes* is drawn from Black folk songs and dances of the 1920s and '30s.

Gil Shaham's virtuosity, warmth, and audience connection make him a favorite guest in Nashville, and to hear him perform Beethoven's Violin Concerto is a rare opportunity. Strauss's An Alpine Symphony uses the sheer force of the orchestra, fortified by extra winds, brass, and percussion, including cowbells plus a giant wind machine that depicts a huge storm.



MAHLER'S MONUMENTAL OPUS

Though the venerable composer Gustav Mahler completed only sketches of his **Symphony No. 10** before his death in 1911, composers and musicologists spent much of the 20th century reconstructing it and filling in the gaps. **Giancarlo Guerrero** enlightens us with a fascinating exploration of this process before conducting Mahler's final opus, considered by many to have been his greatest symphonic work.

We end our season with Orff's Carmina burana, in all its magnificent, carnal beauty. Giancarlo Guerrero programmed it — in its original form — to showcase the powerful forces of the Nashville Symphony and Chorus. On the first half of the program, our soloists in the Orff treat us to Alban Berg's Seven Early Songs and the autobiographical Songs of the Wayfarer of Mahler, who compared his own life to "a traveling journeyman...wandering on in solitude."

For Enrico Lopez-Yañez, entertaining and engaging audiences of all ages comes naturally. In addition to his mad podium skills as the Nashville Symphony's Principal Pops Conductor, he's a prolific composer/arranger and a gifted collaborator who infuses every program with infectious energy and style. He's also a creative force behind many of the orchestra's family and special concerts, including *Pirates! The Search For Blackbeard's Treasure* and our all-original tribute to Barbra Streisand with Tituss Burgess. Who could ask for anything more?
